Our School day

- School gates are open from 8.45 a.m
- Registers are taken from 8.55 a.m. 9.05 a.m

- Morning Nursery 9 a.m 11.30 a.m.

- Our expectation is that all children are in their classrooms at 8.55 a.m and ready to learn. Children who are late must be brought to the School Office and must be signed in.
- Our younger children must be collected from school by an adult. Older siblings and family members can collect if they are 16+ years old and if this has been agreed by the school.
- Breakfast Club is available for N Year 6 children the menu changes every day and includes cereal, yogurt, toast and a drink.
- N Year 2 children will be provided with a healthy snack and Years 3 6 are asked to bring a healthy snack from home. Our expectation is that the children willonly have fruit or nuts and water as a snack.

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Playtimes and lunchtimes

- The children have access to the field and the playground and the staff on duty encourage team games and other activities.
- We also have a climbing frame and fitness trail for the older children to access.
- When the weather is wet the children will go outside for fresh air and use the playground. If the weather is extremely wet the children will stay in their classrooms and the teachers will stay with them to supervise - colouring and table top games will be provided.
- Lunchtime staff supervise the children when they are in the dining hall and outside. Some children have additional staff to support them at lunchtime
- Children can choose a school meal or to bring a packed lunch. The older children have the option to choose a baguette, jacket potato or cooked meal. As salad bar is available.
- The Leadership Team are on duty every day both in the dining area and outside area.

DAY TO DAY ORGANISATION

Admissions

The school will follow and adhere to the current admissions policy of the Vale of Glamorgan LA.

Visits for parents and children of the new intake to Nursery for each term are arranged at the end of the school term preceding the term during which the children will be admitted. On these occasions information regarding all aspects of school organisation will be available; parents will meet relevant staff and visit the areas where their children will spend their time.

For parents of all children seeking admission other than those above, appointments may be offered with the Headteacher or senior staff if appropriate and they will have a meet and greet session.

Parents will be asked to complete admissions forms prior to their child starting and will be asked to show a copy of the child's birth certificate.

School/Parent Contacts (Complaints Proce

When parents have concerns there are a number of direct points of contact which can and should be used in order that issues can be dealt with promptly, transparently and efficiently. Most immediate would be the class teachers. If the issue needs the attention of the Headteacher or senior staff an appointment is necessary in order that a sufficient period of uninterrupted time is devoted to the subject of concern. If the problem is urgent then the school will always seek to respond immediately, other priorities or emergencies permitting.

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All official complaints should in the first instance be made in writing to the Headteacher who will clarify the matter and then, if necessary, make the appropriate formal arrangements to investigate the matter and report back.

In the event of an unsuccessful resolution then the matter should be referred, again in writing, to the Chair of Governors. Please note that Governors should not be approached, officially or unofficially, as this would prejudice any investigation and disqualify them from any involvement in the proceedings.

The Vale of Glamorgan LA may review the School's procedure in dealing with the complaint but will not investigate or make a judgement on the decision itself. Investigation of complaints is entirely the responsibility of the School and the Governing Body.

The school sincerely believes its effective relationships with parents and the local community, and the strenuous efforts it makes to satisfactorily resolve issues transparently, fairly, thoroughly and promptly via informal procedures, will mean that the above official procedures will be rarely called upon.

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Vehicle Access

We do not allow any vehicle access during the school day. The gates are locked between 8.30 a.m. and 3.45 p.m. Any vehicles requiring access must contact the school office before accessing the site.

Administering medication

A member of the Leadership Team will administer medication during the day. Our expectation is that parents complete the appropriate forms and ensure that there is sufficient medication in school. We also expect parents to inform the school of any changes to the medication.

Charging

Parents will be requested to make a contribution towards any school organised function where a fee is charged to the school. If insufficient contributions are forthcoming, indicating that a deficit may arise which will have to be met by the school, then the school reserves the right to cancel the function. With the exception of non-returnable deposits, all paid monies will be returned in full.

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Attendance

Attendance is a key priority for our school. Attendance is monitored weekly and parents are contacted if there are concerns for their child's attendance. If the school feel it is necessary they will make a referral to the Inclusion Service.

Our school target this year is 91%

Our expectation is -

- Parents will contact the school on the morning of an absence and provide a reason for absence
- The school admin officer will contact the parents of any child whose absence isn't explained.
- The school will make contact with parents on day 3 of an illness unless it is an illness expected to exceed 3 days absence
- The Attendance Officer will monitor attendance weekly
- Parents will be contacted if their child's absence is below 91%
- If there is no improvement after 3 weeks a referral will be made to the Inclusion service.
- A reward system will be in place for children above 91% attendance
- Family Holidays in term time will not be authorised

Designed for All - Colcot Curriculum

A school's curriculum is everything a learner experiences in pursuit of the four purposes. It is not simply what we teach, but how we teach and crucially, why we teach it. Curriculum development is at the heart of Colcot Primary School and we seek to raise standards for all, tackle the attainment gap, and ensure an education system that is a source of national pride and confidence.

We are now using inquiry based learning focusing on authentic learning that allows our learners to explore, discuss, and meaningfully construct concepts and relationships in contexts that involve real-world problems and projects that are relevant to the learner. We have identified that it is essential for our learners to have opportunities to gain knowledge and skills of the world around them, particularly focusing on 'Cynefin' (understanding our Welsh heritage).

As a school we have identified the importance of outdoor learning in our curriculum. Therefore we have planned for lots of opportunities for our pupils to engage with the curriculum outdoors in various locations around our community. For example we have used Porthkerry and Barry Island to enhance the learning and to allow our learners to apply their skills and knowledge in real life contexts.

An integral part of preparing for the new curriculum is engaging with parents and informing them – or reminding them – about the changes to come.

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Curriculum for Wales

Progression Step 1 and 2, 3 – 8 Year olds.

At this stage the main learning blocks of learning experiences are laid. The emphasis will be on developing essential skills of communication, literacy and numeracy. By providing a broad rich curriculum using an integrated approach the aim is to develop the children's interests whilst also recognising their level of maturity. These are important years where pupils learn how to observe, listen, respond and develop not only as individuals but as caring members of the school community.

This model is in place for children in the N, R, Y1, Y2 and Y3. The "Integrated Day" operates with discrete Literacy and Numeracy sessions. This involves the children working through a number of preset tasks at their own pace throughout the day. The overriding factor in planning work in all classes and all subjects is appropriate and accurate differentiation for each ability group. The children's work will be designed to suit their ability.

The curriculum is designed to ensure the implementation of the Curriculum for Wales and to reference the Areas of Learning.



Progression Step 3, 8 - 11 Year olds.

The essential skills of communication, literacy and numeracy will be the central focus of the curriculum. As the pupils understanding increases more time will be given to the four AOLEs - Humanities, Expressive Arts, Science and Tech, Health and Wellbeing. The curriculum will still take place within an integrated theme where it is meaningful and relevant. The teaching will be led in an Inquiry based format. Children will be encouraged to develop self - confidence, independence in learning and higher order skills in a range of situations.

Relationships and Sexual Education.

As a school we cover this area of learning fortnightly through the main topics, during our Collective Worship time and use the Jigsaw scheme.

Religion, Values and Ethics.

As a school we cover this area of learning fortnightly through the main topics, during our Collective Worship time and using the Discovery scheme.

Family Conferences

The school arranges 2 family conferences during the year, one in the Autumn and one in the Spring Term.

The children will lead these meetings and share their learning with their family. There will also be an opportunity for the children and teachers to share the next steps of learning.

The school will produce and end of year report for parents in the Summer term detailing the child's achievements in the areas of learning.



Our Community

At Colcot we believe in the importance of strong community links. These links can be developed as part of the curriculum and can involve local businesses and local partnerships.

We develop these links in many different ways and our Family Engagement Officer plays a key role in this work through different projects.

We offer weekly adult learning sessions.





All visitors must sign in on entry to our Reception Office.
